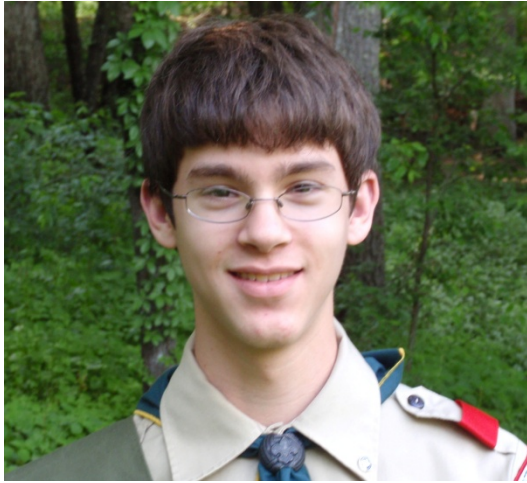


Joshua W. Singer
